Speaker and Emeritus Faculty

John McDowell, PhD
Dean, Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences
Professor of English
Lacombe, Alberta

Dr. John McDowell began his teaching career at Burman University in 1980 after earning an MA in English from La Sierra University. Following two years of teaching, he was retrenched due to low enrollment—a challenge that turned into an opportunity, allowing him to pursue a PhD at the University of Calgary. He returned to Burman in 1985 and worked on completing his dissertation during the summers.

In 1998, Dr. McDowell was appointed Vice President for Academic Administration at Burman University. Seeking broader professional experience, he transitioned to Pacific Union College in 2001, where he taught English and served as Director of the Honors Program. In 2011, circumstances aligned for him to return to Burman University, where he has since served as Dean of Arts and Social Sciences.

Dr. McDowell has played a significant role in academic accreditation efforts, serving on Alberta's Private Colleges Accreditation Board (the precursor to the Campus Alberta Quality Council) from 1993 to 1999—a period during which Burman achieved accreditation for several programs. His dedication to the arts is evident in his time spent at The Banff Centre for the Arts, where he studied under prominent Canadian writers, and as editor of the national literary magazine *Dandelion*.

In addition to his academic pursuits, Dr. McDowell is an accomplished visual artist and a juried member of both the Alberta Society of Artists and the Canadian Sculptors Society (website: jmcdart.com). His scholarly publications include articles on topics such as Vincent van Gogh, South African photographer Pieter Hugo's portraits, and Doris Lessing's African Stories.

Dr. McDowell is passionate about teaching and views students as individuals with immense potential. He strives to help them realize their capabilities by fostering critical thinking and intellectual curiosity. Known for answering questions with questions, he draws inspiration from Northrop Frye's observation in The Great Code: The Bible and Literature:

"The Teacher...is not primarily someone who knows instructing someone who does not know. He is rather someone who attempts to re-create the subject in the student's mind.... To answer a question...is to consolidate the mental level on which the question is asked. Unless something is kept in reserve, suggesting the possibility of better and fuller questions, the student's mental advance is blocked."

Dr. McDowell is married to Lynn McDowell, who works for the Alberta Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, and they have two grown children, Myken and Aran.

Speaker

Andrea Luxton, PhD

Associate Director for Higher Education North American Division of Seventh-day Adventists

Andrea Luxton retired as President of Andrews University in July 2023, having served as an educator in the church for 41 years. In her retirement she is working part-time for the North American Division, responsible for higher education.

Luxton has been a teacher and principal at secondary level, and a faculty, academic administrator and president in higher education. She was the first woman to serve as president at Newbold College, England; Burman University, Canada; and Andrews University, Michigan, United States.

She has also worked in positions at Union and General Conference levels (and now division level). In the British Union she was Education Director and held additional responsibilities in Sabbath School and Women's Ministries. At the General Conference she was the Secretary of the Adventist Accrediting Association and Associate Education Director, with particular responsibilities for the North American Division, the South-Pacific Division, the Trans-European Division, and the West-African Division.



Excellence in Teaching

Jonathan Campbell, PhD
Assistant Professor of New Testament Studies

Jonathan Campbell is from Seattle, Washington. He is married to Kathleen, and holds degrees in Theology, Biblical Languages, Linguistics, and a PhD in New Testament studies. He has published on the interpretation and application of several New Testament books, and much of his research focuses on Greek New Testament manuscripts.

Excellence in Scholarship

Oktavian Mantiri, PhD Associate Professor of Education

Dr. Oktavian Mantiri is an Associate Professor of Education at Burman University. He earned his Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) in Education from the University of Newcastle, New South Wales, Australia. He also holds a Master of Education (M.Ed.) degree from the University of Sydney, and a Bachelor of Education from Universitas Klabat, Manado, Indonesia.

Dr. Mantiri previously served as an Associate Professor at Universitas Klabat, Indonesia, and as a Senior Lecturer at Asia-Pacific International University, Thailand. With over three decades of teaching and research experience in higher education institutions across Southeast Asia and Australia, he has made significant contributions to the academic community. He has supervised and examined master's and doctoral theses at various universities in Indonesia, Thailand, and Australia.

His scholarly work includes the publication of numerous peer-reviewed journal articles and a book chapter. His current research interests lie in the areas of classroom management, social and emotional learning (SEL), and teacher preparation programs. Dr. Mantiri is deeply committed to fostering a culture of inquiry among pre-service teachers, encouraging student engagement in research as a fundamental component of professional development. He strongly believes that research constitutes the core of the higher education enterprise, shaping its practices, informing its pedagogy, and enriching its academic culture.

Excellence in Service

Tennyson Samraj, PhD Professor of Philosophy

Tennyson Samraj was born in India where he completed his studies. He earned a BA in Religion from Spicer College, followed by an MA in History and PhD in Philosophy from Pune University. He worked at Spicer College and Hume McHenry School before coming to Canada to teach at Burman in 1990. At Burman, Dr. Samraj served as the head of the History department. Currently, he leads the General Arts Department as the program chair.

Dr. Samraj teaches the philosophy classes at Burman, and his approach to teaching is guided by the principle, "If a teacher cannot teach without a textbook the teacher cannot expect students to write exams without a textbook." His students would agree that he places them first in his life, and he believes that the classroom is the best place in the world.

Dr. Samraj is known for his service around the community. He is a lead teacher for a Sabbath school class at College Heights SDA church and is invited to speak at many churches. He welcomes students or faculty who need a place to stay into his home and is a regular contributor to the choir, orchestra, and mission trips.

Beyond his academic work, Dr. Samraj has a deep passion for painting, particularly portraiture. His subjects often include those who have made significant contributions to society. Over the years, he has hosted numerous exhibits with different themes including Philosophers, Scientists, Politicians, and Great Lives. 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Administration

Academic Costume

The pageantry and costume of commencement have been inherited from the European universities of the eleventh and twelfth centuries. Academic life as we know it today began in medieval times, first in the church and then in the guilds. The teaching guild was the Guild of the Master of Arts where the Bachelor was the apprentice of the Master, and the dress was the outward sign of privilege and responsibility. Rather early it became necessary for colleges and universities to set rules to preserve the dignity and meaning of academic dress. Today, most institutions adopt a distinctive design for academic attire.

GOWN: Academic gowns come in a variety of designs and colours. These designs, particularly the sleeves, reflect the level of the academic degree of the wearer. While most gowns are black, many universities use gowns of other colours for doctoral degrees.

HOOD: In general, the size and complexity of the hood reflect the level of the degree of the wearer ~ the longer and more complex the hood, the higher the degree. The interior colours of the hood are generally the colours of the degree-granting institution, while the border colours represent the academic discipline.

CAP: Traditionally, the cap has had a square, solid design and is known as a "mortarboard." Some universities use a round or octagonal tam for doctoral degrees. Sometimes, the colour of the tassel indicates the academic discipline. A gold tassel is often used for doctoral degrees.

Honours

Where merited, Burman University confers degrees with three levels of academic honours: cum laude for honours (red cords), magna cum laude for high honours (red and gold cords), and summa cum laude for highest honours (gold cords). The academic honours published and announced during the convocation ceremonies are based on the graduate's academic record as of January 1 of the year of convocation. The academic honours, as printed on the official transcript and parchment, include all course work completed during the term of study immediately prior to the convocation ceremonies and, therefore, may be different from the previously announced designations.

Burman University Scholars is a competitive program offered as an alternative to the general or breadth education requirements for Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science degrees. Scholars is geared towards students that are intellectually curious and who wish to engage with others in cultivating the life of the mind. Established on the belief that knowledge is profoundly interconnected, Scholars is committed to integrated, interdisciplinary education designed to transcend the barriers between such traditionally separate fields as art, history, science, theology, and philosophy. Courses are team-taught by faculty from differing disciplines.

Burman Advantage is a non-academic program that recognizes student involvement in their volunteer and co-curricular activities from their time as a Burman University student. This program is designed to encourage students to create, lead, and support other students and programs both on and off campus. Burman Advantage recognizes that the student experience is encapsulated by more than classroom activities and acknowledges participation in leadership and service efforts that help shape and develop students throughout their time in university. Graduates with the Burman Advantage designation will receive an official certificate that can be linked to their resume and added to their professional portfolio.

University Mace

The Burman University mace was commissioned to honour the May 1, 2015 institutional name change. Former university registrar, Mr. Lawrence Murrin, designed the mace, while Mr. Gerald Whitehead, a retired Canadian Union College and Parkview Adventist Academy instructor, translated the design into a black walnut and brass work of art. The disc at the top of the mace holds on both sides the crest of Burman University. The brass holder of the disk bears the symbol of the Seventh-day Adventist church. The foursided head of the mace bears medallions that trace the history of the university. Three brass rings encircle the shaft, each engraved with one clause of the university's mission statement: think with discernment; believe with insight and commitment; act with confidence, compassion, and competence.

In medieval times, the mace symbolized authority over life and death and was held by a dignitary's bodyguard at ceremonial functions. Today the mace represents the power of knowledge.

The Burman University mace symbolizes the university's contributions to the creation and dissemination of knowledge. It also marks the university's values of excellence, service, spirituality, integrity, and community. During formal university convocations, the marshal carries the mace before the university president and places it in full view of the assembly during the proceedings. Between convocations it is kept in a display case in the President's Office.
